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<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Maharashtra Mahavidylaya Nilanga is permanently affiliated to Swami Ramanand teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. It is recognized under 2(f) and 12 (b) of the UGC act. It the oldest institute of higher education in the region imparting quality higher education since last more than fifty years. It runs under the aegis of Maharashtra Shikshan Samiti (M.S.S.) which was established in 1968 by the great freedom fighter, visionary leader and former Chief Minister of Maharashtra Late Dr. Shivajirao Patil Nilangekar Saheb. In the past 56 years of selfless service of educating the rural underprivileged and deprived masses, the institution has shouldered the responsibility to educating them from UG to PG and beyond; not just making them literate but also responsible citizens. The institution has grown from a plant to a banyan tree hosting the cozy nests of Pre-Primary, Primary, Secondary, Higher Secondary, and college units imparting educational nourishments to around 8000 students every year.

Curricular Aspects

- Maharashtra Shikshan Samiti's Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya Nilnaga is committed to effectively deliver its curriculum through meticulously planned and closely monitored process in alignment with its vision, mission and goals. *The Annual Academic and Activities Calendar* is in accordance with the long term and short term perspective plans of the institution. It incorporates the activities to be organized during the year by the Annual Committees, Departments and library, Sports, NSS and NCC etc. consciously planned by the IQAC.
- Internal Assessment and Evaluation process is robust, transparent, and grievances are resolved timely.
- 26 Add-on courses and 625 students completing project, field works, and internships a year make the students employable.
- The teachers prepare their academic calendar and timetables under the guidance of HODs, and in accordance with master time table of the college.
- College has implemented Choice Based Credit System as per its policy. It offers course choices as per the structure offered by the parent university.
- Curriculum of the college is enriched through incorporation of crosscutting issues relevant to professional ethics, gender human values and environment and sustainability. In addition to the curricular aspects, the crosscutting issues are inculcated on the minds of the students through institutionalized special activities.
- The effective curriculum delivery methods adopted by the college have resulted into more than 46% of student placement and progression as well as 43 students appearing in the university merit. Our students have achieved 213 medals and awards for their spectacular performances in the sports and cultural activities.
- Feedback mechanism of the college is robust and consistently providing an insight to our teaching learning, evaluation and evaluation process. Teaching-learning and Evaluation

It has a rich legacy of 54 years of quality teaching which makes it an exemplary institution in the University periphery. Our Patron Late Dr. Shivajirao Patil Nilangekar always insisted on recruitment of quality teachers on the basis of their academic merit. He always persisted to the policy of strengthening the educational units with quality teaching and learning resources. The college follows the standards set by parent university and the State Govt. regarding the evaluation process.

- The college has a Continuous Internal Evaluation Policy and a cell which monitors the effective conduct of all internal examinations including practicals, assignments and tutorials of the students.
- The college also has an external examination cell which conducts the external examinations as and when declared by the parent university.
- The student performances are measured through Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes at periodic intervals. The college also displays the PO & CO analysis reports and attainments on its website.
- The passing percentage of final year students of the college is 81.38%

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution has secured a total of ?16,41,000 in grants from both government and non-governmental sources for research projects and endowments, reflecting a robust financial support system for research activities. It has cultivated an innovative ecosystem by promoting the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) and establishing Research Promotion Committee. These initiatives support knowledge creation and technology transfer, with their successful outcomes evident in the institution's achievements.

The institution has organized 33 workshops, seminars, and conferences focused on research methodology, IPR, and entrepreneurship. These events have been crucial in enhancing research skills and fostering innovation among faculty and students. Furthermore, 20 research papers authored by the institution's teachers have been published in journals listed on the UGC CARE list, demonstrating a significant contribution to academic research.

In addition to journal articles, faculty members have published 208 books and chapters in edited volumes, and

presented papers at national and international conferences. This substantial output underscores the institution's active participation in academic and scholarly discourse.

With a teaching staff of 80 teachers, the institution maintains a strong faculty base dedicated to both teaching and research. The outcomes of its extension activities reflect the institution's commitment to societal engagement. These activities have created positive impact on local community and contributed to students' holistic development by raising awareness about various social issues.

The institution has received 53 awards and recognitions and letters of appreciation from government and recognized bodies for its extension activities. They indicate both the collective efforts of the institution and the individual contributions of faculty members towards creating impact. Over last five years, 88 extension and outreach programs have been conducted in collaboration with various stakeholders, including industry, community, and government and non-government organizations. These programs have been executed through platforms like NSS, NCC, the Department of Physical Education and Sports, and through individual faculty initiatives.

Moreover, the institution has established 30 functional Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) and linkages with institutions and industries in India. These partnerships facilitate internships, on-the-job training, student and faculty exchanges, and collaborative research, further enhancing the institution's research capabilities and practical exposure for its students and faculty.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The academics of the college are supported by the spacious and green campus of more than 22 acres, of which 4.5 acres are specified for Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya Nilanga. The academic ambience of the college is enhanced by the infrastructural facilities provided to the students by the college.
- The college has 09 buildings with total built up area 12,927.52 of sq. mt. (1,39,145 sq. ft.). The physical facilities of the college comprise of 41 class rooms, 18 smart class rooms, 08 computer laboratories, 06 science laboratories, a library, 01 seminar hall, 01 indoor sports complex hosting 2 badminton courts, 2 gymnasiums, wrestling mats, Kabaddi Ground, outdoor facilities for volleyball, basketball, football, cricket, running track, and Kho-Kho among other athletic grounds. The participation of students in various sports activities, utilizing an expansive open playground guided by a qualified physical director has yielded a total of 75 university level, and state level medals in the sports competitions
- In the ICT infrastructure of the college, we have 294 Computers, 08 laptops, 12 smart TVs, 5 Projectors and Smart Boards, 07 internet connections with 100 mbps speed. Software of ERP like CIMS are also in functioning in the college. The student to computer ratio of the college is 6:1.
- Among other amenities in the campus, college has boys hostel, girl's hostel, guest room, and a principal's quarter.
- Expenses on infrastructure development and augmentation during the last five years are 32.74%. Expenses on Infrastructure maintenance during the last five years are 43.12 %
- Library is fully automated with integrated library management system. It has all the modules of Soul 3.0 software. And subscriptions to the e-resources are updated regularly. In total, library has 69,376 books with special racks allotted to the rare books, and encyclopaedias etc.

• College frequently updates its ICT facilities in the campus. It has provided access to all the students to the free Wi-Fi connectivity in the campus.

The infrastructural facilities in the campus supplement the teaching learning activities and also provide opportunities to the holistic development of the students.

Student Support and Progression

Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya, Nilanga is committed for the all round development of our students and their progression in higher education. The college provides facilities such as Scholarship, Free-ship, NGO Scholarship, Merit scholarship and different training and placement programs to support our students economically and make them self reliant. The college also has a registered alumni association which actively participates in different activities and contributes to the holistic growth and development of our students. The measures taken for student support and progression can best be expressed as follows:

- On an average 53.12% students have been benefited with different types of scholarship schemes during the last five years.
- The college has organized different capacity building programmes such as soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills and ICT skills during the last five years.
- On an average 40.66% students have been benefited with different types of programmes, guidance for competitive examination and career counseling activities during the last five years.
- The IQAC has prepared Student Grievance Redressal Policy, and as per the policy a mechanism is developed to address the grievances.
- On an average the rate of student placement of outgoing students and their progression to higher education is 46.75% during the last five years.
- During last five years, our 112 students have achieved different awards/medals for their outstanding performance in sports/ cultural activities at University/State/National level.
- During last five years, 56.60% students have participated in different sports and cultural activities organized by our college and other institutions.
- Our college has a registered alumni association which contributes in monitory as well as non-monitory form for the betterment of needy students.
- Our esteemed alumni includes former Member of Parliament Dr. Sunil Gaikwad, Junior Magistrate Mr. Ajit Mare, Mr. Sacles Pimple, Registrar in Revenue Department, Govt. of Maharashtra, Mr. Mallinath Dange, Entrepreneur Mr. Sandip Shinde, Self employed Mr. Prasad Mule, Retired Principal, Dr. R.D. Kamble, etc.
- Alumni Association frequently participate in different activities such as blood donation, tree plantation, development of crematorium, developing scientific temperament, participation in various programmes organised by NCC and NSS in the town as well as in different villages near Nilanga.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has a vision of providing quality education to the rural masses who are educationally deprived. It also tries to achieve its missions through a variety of activities in every academic year. The institutional governance is robust, dynamic and inclusive.

- The college has organized 01 National Level Seminar and 01 University Level Workshop on NEP-2020.
- Our teachers have contributed 14 Research articles on NEP-2020 in different reputed journals.
- We have also created ABC ID's of its students for effective implementation of NEP-2020.
- Our three faculty members have been nominated on BoS of the parent university and 02 faculty members are nominated as BoS members of an Autonomous College under NEP-2020.
- We have conducted Green and Energy audit for the environment sustainability.
- We follow decentralization in its administration and governance through 45 different committees and cells.
- The college has also prepared and implemented its Perspective Plan for the period of 2019-2024.
- We have an effective mechanism of functioning through more than 50 policies, handbooks, manuals and SoP's etc.
- We follow all the rules and regulations regarding appointment, service and retirement of staff members.
- We have an e-governance policy and it implements e-governance in its operations like administration, finance and accounts, student admission and support and examination.
- We have our own Performance Appraisal Policy for both teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 12 faculty members were promoted to Professor, 6 faculty members were promoted to Associate Professor and 4 Faculty members have been advanced to Level 10 to 11 & Level 11 to 12 in the last five years.
- 42 (18.10%) faculty members were provided with financial assistance of more than Rs. 94000/- in the last five years to participate in different conferences, seminars and workshops etc.
- 53 (22.48%) Faculty members have participated in different FDP's while 58 (72.50) Non-teaching staff members have taken different administrative trainings during last five years.
- We have our own Finance Policy and it conducts all internal and external audits regularly.

IQAC conducts regular meetings to ensure and strengthen its quality initiatives, collaborative activities and participation in different quality audits etc.

- Teachers and students are financed for participation in seminars, competitions etc. to upgrade their skills which ultimately contribute to effective curriculum delivery.
- After reviewing university syllabus, college has designed 27 Add-on Courses to bridge the skills gap for making students employable.
- 03 teachers and 03 students contribute to syllabus of university as members of various Boards of Studies.

Process of Implementation

We have three-tier implementation and monitoring system. To ensure effective curriculum delivery mechanism can best be viewed in the following diagram.

• Regular Attendance --> Daily Teaching Report Diaries --> Syllabus Completion Reports

• Attendance and DTRs by the Teachers are monitored by the HODs and verified by the Principal

Curriculum Delivery Review and Re-adjustment

- 1. Examination and Evaluation Cell notifies the dates and details of Continuous Internal Evaluation. It ensures the assessment process is completed punctually, impartially and transparently and the marks are displayed and grievances are resolved properly.
- 2. Home Assignments, Tutorials, Practical, Internal, External examinations, Projects and internships are monitored by the Cell.
- 3. Result analysis, among other parameters, forms the basis of identifying slow and advanced learners for remedial coaching and counseling.
- 4. Feedback on POs and COs attainment, Teacher's Feedback on Curriculum, Students' feedback and Alumni Feedback on teaching-learning, curriculum and syllabus completion is collected, analyzed and submitted to the Principal which is further discussed in the IQAC. Accordingly actions are taken and ATR is prepared.
- 5. As per the feedback analysis and the POs and COs attainment reports, necessary re-adjustments in curriculum delivery and corrective measures are taken.

These measures for effective curriculum delivery have resulted in **81.38%** pass percentage, 42 students in university merit, **112** students' achievements in sports and cultural activities and maximum students satisfaction over POs and COs attainment during the last five years. On an average more than **46%** students have been successfully placed or progressed for further education.

The Knowledge Resource Centre or Library of Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya is nurturing generations of readers, scholars and researchers right from the establishment of the college in 1970. It is catering to the needs of the curious learning fraternity of the institution upgrading itself technically and earning relevance by purchases of new books. Library is housed in a magnificent building with built up area 797.20 sq. m. (8580 sq. ft.) which includes separate wings for stack, reference section, circulation section, reading halls for boys, girls and staff, journal section, computer laboratory, preservation & technical processing unit. It supports the college rigorous programs in graduate, post-graduate and research.

It is offering collections in multiple formats, providing access to worldwide library resources and services. It contains 69,376 commendably classified text books, rare books and reference books. The college subscribes to N-List & DELNET in addition to e-books, e-Journals and databases which supplement the users for gaining knowledge.

Library has adopted a slogan 'open access to easy access' to the resources and has also established links with sister Institution in order to provide Inter-Library Loan facility.

In order to conserve the printed heritage for future generation, the Library personnel take all efforts for preservation.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1

Keeping in mind the importance of the ICT infrastructure in every aspect of functioning of college, Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya keeps pace with the upgrades in technology and makes provisions for newer technologies for efficiency in teaching-learning, evaluation and administration. To keep itself ready for receiving the ground breaking benefits of ICT, college installs latest software, and purchases various IT devices and pedagogical tools.

College provides Wi-Fi facilities for students. There are 7 Wi-Fi access points installed on the campus. All the departments, cells, offices, laboratories, sports complex, library, smart class rooms have easy access to the internet. College encourages the teachers and the students to maximize the use of ICT tools for making teaching learning activities more interactive and fruitful.

Computer laboratory is with cloud based server. The computer laboratories are regularly maintained. New computers replace the old ones.

The website of the college is a valuable resource to the students to keep themselves updated and informed. It hosts all the syllabi of the university, add-on courses and also important events /notices.

During the last five years, college has made voluble increase in the ICT infrastructure. No. of computers on the campus have increased. The bandwidth and the number of internet connections have also increased during the last five years.

IT Facilities:

- All departments are furnished with desktop computers with internet connectivity with LAN and Wi-Fi.
- Institution has 17 ICT classrooms including 14 smart-classrooms, one seminar hall, 01 auditorium well equipped with facilities like LCD projectors, LAN, Wi-Fi, audio-visual aids.
- There are 07 computer labs in both the buildings of the institute.
- Total number of computers in the college is 294. Building No. 01 has total number of 174 and Building No 02 has 120 computers.
- We have 8 laptops and 5 Smart Boards and 12 Smart TVs.
- The college has a large offset machine and two Xerox/photocopier machines.
- Complementary to the IT infrastructure, the college has 10 network devices and 110 software and License details.
- A total of 63 CCTV surveillance cameras have been installed in the college which help in proper monitoring of the infrastructure including ICT infrastructure and for safety & security.
- Computer systems are installed and upgraded regularly with licensed copies of software and antivirus protection. The whole examination system is administered using MKCL online software.
- There are 23 printers and scanners in the college.
- For recording the attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff, a bio-metric machine is installed.
- The website of the college is administered and updated regularly by the website committee.
- In comparison to the IT infrastructure on the campus in May 2018, till June 2023 college has increased the IT infrastructure as shown below:

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

1. Title of the Best Practice: Environment Conservation

The Context:

Maharashtra Mahavidyalaya is situated in the Rain Shadow Region of Maharashtra with less than 600mm average annual rainfall. The region is known in India for drought and water scarcity of unprecedented kind. The administration in the region had to import water in train bogies from other states during drought times. The region has also recorded low groundwater levels in various surveys. Keeping in view the facts and figures, and also the global warming resulting into uneven distribution of rain, seasonal changes, loss of biodiversity, and rapidly melting glaciers, college decided to work towards the conservation of environment through various activities.

Objectives

1. To contribute to the conservation of environment and sustainability through various activities in the neighbouring community.

2. To educate and inform the public about the importance of environment conservation.

3. To reduce pollution levels of all kinds through manual work and create awareness about the same.

4. To practice and create awareness about minimising resource wastage, water wastage, and energy wastage.

The Practice:

To give a voluntary and voluble contribution to the environment, the college has participated in the environment conservation projects by the government, Non- government organisations, and has organized many activities on its own. The following kinds of activities were organised during the last five years.

- 13 special tree plantation drives
- 8 manual labour activities for water conservation, irrigation and waste water management
- Special camp by NSS on "Environment and Conservation of Natural Resources"
- Seed balls making activity: thousands of seed balls of varieties of plants were made and spread for natural sprouting and growth.
- Save Soil Campaign for soil conservation and awareness lecture on soil testing
- 10 Cleanliness campaigns for pollution control, and sensitizing the neighouring community
- Participation in Water Cup and Water Conservation Activities
- 04 NSS Camps consisting of 5 environment conservation activities each.
- Celebration of nationally important days, birthdays, etc. by planting trees
- 36 such activities were organized.

Evidence of success

The practice has yielded these outcomes.

1. Number and diversity of plants in the neighbouring community, adopted villages, and in the campus has considerably increased.

- 2. An increase in awareness about soil conservation, water conservation and tree census.
- 3. Better groundwater levels and water catchment.
- 4. Reduced levels of pollutions like air, water, and soil.

5. Beyond the campus activities appreciated by the local administration.

Problems encountered and resources required

A large number of plants and seeds of aboriginal varieties were required for increasing plant biodiversity.

Lack of common understanding among the society, government departments and local governance bodies on the need for collective efforts and urgency of the issue

A large number of participants were required.

Non-availability of Experts in water, soil and plant biodiversity conservation

The difficulties were overcome by signing MoUs, collaborating with the government offices, nurseries, social workers and NGOs etc.

Notes

The practice needs to be organised on a larger scale by creating an understanding between local administration, government bodies, local communities and other educational and non-profit non-governmental organisations.

2. Title of the Best Practice: Aarogyam Dhan Sampada (Health is Wealth)

Objectives of the activity

1. To contribute to the health and well-being of the students and the neighbouring community.

2. To create through awareness health-conscious, scientifically informed behaviours among the students for longevity.

3. To contribute to the health of the neighbouring community by organising blood donation camps, health check-up and treatment camps and contributing to the vaccination drives.

4. To foster a culture of preventive care and holistic living.

The context

Global context: Today, more than ever, health issues have become critical. The diseases unheard of and psychological disorders of appalling kinds are emerging. The long battle of mankind with the microbes like bacteria, fungi, and viruses has become fierce. The microbes spreading through communicable diseases have led to a pandemic. Millions have died and millions more are struggling daily against the diseases. The more we upgrade our medicines, the more immune the microbes become to it. As such, the challenge is manifold.

Local Context: The ill effects of students' sedentary and disorderly lifestyle, vitamin and mineral deficiency, lack of sleep, limited social life and health superstitions were being observed by us in the form of their dizziness, physical ailments, lack of concentration and swooning. The best practice *Aarogyam Dhan Sampada* was selected as it was observed as necessary to make lifestyle changes, spread awareness of preventive care, inculcate healthy habits, diagnosing diseases at early stages and actively participate in the community health services.

The Practice

With objectives stated above, college has organised 36 activities in the neighbourhood and in the campus. After consciously planning the activities across all the important aspects of physical and mental health, the college has voluminously contributed to the health and well-being of the stakeholders. This practice was conducted in collaboration with the Govt. Rural Sub-district Hospital, other private hospitals and doctors. The activities involved following kinds and numbers.

The activities organized under the practices consisted of :

- 07 Disease Diagnosis Camps
- 04 Blood Donation Camps

- 04Vaccination Camps for Polio and Covid-19
- 07 Yoga and Exercise Activities
- 02 AIDS Awareness Programs
- Poster Presentation Competition on Diagnostic test poster
- 03 Mental Health Awareness and Stress Management programs
- To study X-ray machine
- Activities under Fit India, World Health Day & World Anti-Drugs Day
- Awareness on Dental Health, Viral Communicable Diseases, Women's Health Issues,

Evidence of success

- 1. 270 blood bags were donated to the needy.
- 2. More than 1000 people diagnosed and medical advices prescribed
- 3. 310 people vaccinated
- 4. CBC tests of 320 students

5 Students were observed physically and mentally empowered and with reduced stress and anxiety.

Problems encountered

- 1. Expensive medical tests
- 2. Non-availability of psychiatrist and counsellors in the locality.
- 3. Students hailing from humble backgrounds were observed unable to follow balanced diet planning.
- 4. Health related Superstitions.

The resources required

- 1. Expert Doctors, free diagnostic tests and blood banks in the vicinity.
- 2. The requirements were fulfilled by the government pathological lab and the doctors. The blood banks from the district places joined our cause.

Notes

The activities of these kinds are very helpful in providing necessary guidance, counselling and treatment to the needy stakeholders especially after the pandemic it has become more evident.

The colleges should extend their expertise, resources and human resources to the health and well-being of the society.

Objectives of the Activity

2. To orient the students towards world class cinema, its genres and cultural significance.

3. To introduce the field of Film Studies to the students by organising film appreciation workshops, interaction with film critics and film crew,

4. To introduce critically acclaimed documentary films, short films and feature films to the students so that they will watch only the best contents.

5. To enable students to logically analyse a film and express their readings of the films and encourage them to think critically and creatively.

The Context:

1. It is the vision of the college to impart interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary studies to the students and Film and Media Studies are such important fields of study.

2. In the light of the fact that every day each college going student is spending hours and consuming gigabytes of data in watching the contents online, media and film literacy are the need of the hour.

3. More than ever before, the films are easily accessible and being watched in a variety of modes and through personal gadgets. However, not all that the students watch is worth their time and there is no handy system of guiding the students what and how to watch.

4. The world over, film is being studied as the fourth genre of literature, the students in our college need to be at par with those students.

5. Film is a reflection of the culture and milieu of which it is a product, hence it invites serious critical attention for cultural studies and holistic education of students.

6. As such, Campus Film Societies or Film Clubs have a responsibility of educating the young minds how to watch and what to watch with help of cine-critics, scholars, film directors, producers and actors.

The Practice

M. M. Campus Film Society was established in the college in the academic year 2012–13. The campus Film Society is affiliated to the Federation of Film Societies of India, western region, Mumbai chapter. Every year, a body of student office bearers is selected which helps in organising the programmes. The Campus film society organises Film Appreciation Workshops, International Short Film Festival, Screenings of Short Films, Documentaries, and Feature Films which are followed by a guided discussion. Before the screening, an introduction to the film is given which contains details of the film such as its year of release, duration, director, major cast and crew along with a brief information on the plot and themes. After the screening the students participate in the discussion and share their observations and feedback on the screened short film or documentary. For film appreciation workshops renowned film critics, international film jury members, national award winning directors and cine-enthusiasts are invited. They train the students the art and science of film appreciation and analysis. The selection of the film or documentary is done on its merit to sensitise the students about some social problems and its artistic value.

Evidence of Success:

1. The students are able to analyse a film in terms of its major themes, plot, art of characterisation, editing, cinematography and direction.

2. They communicate their analysis and observations in discussions after the screening.

3. The students write feedback, film appreciations and film reviews.

4. There are 41 Articles written by the students on the movies watched by them.

Difficulties Encountered and Resources Required:

The primary difficulty in organising the screenings was availability of best films. It was overcome by affiliation with the FFSI. The federation provided the necessary films and permissions to organise the screenings.

Another difficulty was of having a proper ventilated hall with good audio system and black out facility. The institution provided the college with the facilities required.

College being located far from the film industry there was difficulty in making available the renowned film critics, jury members, directors and crew of the film for providing first hand knowledge of the film making and film appreciation. The issue was overcome by signing an MoU with Abhijat Film Society, Latur. The guests are jointly invited by M. M. Campus Film Society and Abhijat Film Society Latur. The expenses of the guests and screening are jointly borne by the two societies.
